In early October, Anne and I were privileged to attend the LCMC's Annual Gathering in Frisco, Texas. The LCMC (Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ) is the association that this church belongs to and we should be proud to belong to such an association.

If you've ever attended an ELCA Synod Assembly or ELCA National Assembly, you know that a good deal of your time is spent in business sessions, talking about budgets, social statements, and the election of bishops. The structure of the LCMC, though, begins and ends with the local congregation. As such, there will never be social statements developed by the powers that be. Such things are left largely for the local congregation to decide. All this is to say that a small portion of the assembly was spent in business session.

The theme for the conference was DNA with the question posed by the speakers, "what makes up the DNA of the LCMC?" The pastors, theologians, and LCMC staff that spoke all approached this question in one way or another. It is hard to sum up the messages of the different speakers, but Anne and I both walked away encouraged and edified. I would encourage you to stay tuned to the LCMC website this winter when videos of the speakers are posted – especially the keynote address given by Rev. Dr. Bruce Wilder.

Outside of general assembly with worship, speakers, and the occasional report, there were also breakout sessions to attend. For the most part, this has been the weakest portion of the conference both last year and this. That said, Anne and I did attend a very interesting session on Effective Ministry in Small Congregations.

While the LCMC doesn't put together commissions to develop social statements, on one of the evenings a panel was held to help answer questions concerning the Supreme Court's decision on gay marriage. I found this to be very interesting as a few pastors (one a former lawyer), a couple professors/theologians, and a Texas district judge answered questions submitted by the audience. Having attended more than a few ELCA Synod Assemblies where discussion often became quite heated, it was nice to be amongst people of very much the same mind. It was also pleasing to see pastors wrestling over how to faithfully adhere to their convictions, while not (at this time) breaking the law of the land and at the same time proclaim the Word with compassion. In the end, I walked away from this session confident that the proposed bylaw put forward by our own church council will protect us at least until the law of the land changes again.

Thank you for sending Anne and I to the gathering. Through the sessions we attended and through conversations with others (some of them longtime friends), we both came back encouraged and energized for the ministry of our church.



The History of Thanksgiving Submitted by Marilyn Malmedal

Thanksgiving, or Thanksgiving Day, is a holiday celebrated in the United States on the fourth Thursday in November. It has been celebrated as a federal holiday every year since 1863, when, during the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed a national day of "Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens", to be celebrated on the last Thursday in November. Thanksgiving was also celebrated nationally in 1789, after a proclamation by George Washington. As a federal and public holiday in the U.S., Thanksgiving is one of the major holidays of the year. Together with Christmas and New Year, Thanksgiving is a part of the broader holiday season.

The event that Americans commonly call the "First Thanksgiving" was celebrated by the Pilgrims after their first harvest in the New World in 1621. This feast lasted three days, and it was attended by 90 Native Americans (as accounted by attendee Edward Winslow) and 53 Pilgrims. The New England colonists were accustomed to regularly celebrating "thanksgivings"—days of prayer thanking God for blessings such as military victory or the end of a drought.

Thanksgiving is not just a holiday, not the day before Black Friday, (a shopping day). However, it is a time for families giving thanks to God for all we have been provided throughout the year. This is what we need to get back to in our society, THANKFULNESS.

On January 5, 6, and 7th our church will be taking part in the LCMC's annual Three Days of Prayer. From the LCMC's website:

"Our attitude toward prayer has often been characterized by saying, 'well, all we can do now is pray!' Prayer is not the hopeless act of desperation. Prayer is a gift that God has given to us as a means to approach the throne of grace with confidence—like that of a child coming to her parents sharing concerns, victories, defeats and every part of life. It is an opportunity to express the deepest heartache and the greatest joy. Prayer is a conversation between the Creator and the created...and the conversation began with God, for us, in Christ Jesus."

For most of the three days of prayer, we will participate as individuals. But on day two (Wednesday, January 6th), everyone is invited to attend an evening prayer service at Peace Lutheran. Look for more details on the Three Days of Prayer as January draws closer. Until then, read below for more information on what is to be covered during the three days.

Day One: January 5

This is a day focused on <u>confession</u>. We have made our lives, our relationships—and even the church—in our own image. We confess that the church belongs to Jesus and not to us. On this day we lay down our pride, our sin and our agenda and ask the Lord for forgiveness, which He gives freely and with mercy through Jesus Christ.

Day Two: January 6

This is a day of <u>petition</u>. Pray for your congregation, for the pastor, for the leaders, for those who carry out ministries, for the Sunday School teachers, for the Confirmation leaders, for those leading Bible studies and for those leading small groups. Pray for those in hospitals and nursing homes. Pray for all those connected to your church that they might know God's redeeming love for all in Christ.

Day Three: January 7

This is a day for <u>vision</u>. Pray that the Holy Spirit will again move through the hearts and minds of leaders

and pastors that God's vision for His church might be revealed and fulfilled. This is a time of prayer for renewal, revival and encouragement. Pray for God's vision.

"Deck of Cards"

It was quiet that day, the guns and the mortars, and land mines for some reason hadn't been heard. The young soldier knew it was Sunday, the holiest day of the week. As he was sitting there, he got out an old deck of cards and laid them out across his bunk. Just then an army sergeant came in and said, 'Why aren't you with the rest of the platoon?' The soldier replied, 'I thought I would stay behind and spend some time with the Lord.' The sergeant said, 'Looks to me like you're going to play cards.' The soldier said, 'No, sir. You see, since we are not allowed to have Bibles or other spiritual books in this country, I've decided to talk to the Lord by studying this deck of cards.' The sergeant asked in disbelief, 'How will you do that?'

'You see the Ace, Sergeant? It reminds me that there is only one God.

The **Two** represents the two parts of the Bible, Old and New Testaments.

The Three represents the Father, Son and the Holy Ghost.

The Four stands for the Four Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

The **Five** is for the five virgins; there were ten but only five of them were glorified.

The Six is for the six days it took God to create the Heavens and Earth.

The Seven is for the day God rested after making His Creation.

The **Eight** is for the family of Noah and his wife, he three sons and their wives – the eight people God spared from the flood that destroyed the Earth.

The Nine is for the lepers that Jesus cleansed of leprosy – He cleansed ten, but nine never thanked him.

The Ten represents the Ten Commandments that God handed down to Moses on tablets made of stone.

The **Jack** is a reminder of Satan, one of God's first angels, but he got kicked out of heaven for his sly and wicked ways and is now the joker of eternal hell.

The Queen stands for the Virgin Mary.

The King stands for Jesus, for he is the King of all kings.

When I count the dots on all the cards, I come up with 365 total, one for every day of the year. There are a total of 52 cards in a deck; each is a week – 52 weeks in a year. The four suits represent the four seasons: Spring, Summer, Fall, and Winter. Each suit has thirteen cards – there are exactly thirteen weeks in a quarter. So when I want to talk to God and thank him,

I just pull out this deck of cards and they remind me of all that I have to be thankful for.'

The sergeant just stood there. After a minute, with tears in his eyes and pain in his heart, he said, 'Soldier, can I borrow that deck of cards?'

Mission for the Month of November Vision Slovakia: Center for Christian Education (www.cce.sk) Martin, Slovakia



For 40 years, due to communist regime, people in Slovakia could not freely adhere to Christian principles, let alone acknowledge Christian education as an important value. The life of the church was narrowed to ministry by pastors only. Lay ministry was unwelcomed and any efforts in the area of church growth were stopped radically. Due to the damaging effects of communism on people's belief system, many families have almost completely wandered away from the church. Spiritual poverty and lack of values has become a common feature in many lives.

Since 1989, after communist regime was finally over, Christianity in Slovakia got its second chance. The church once again began to rediscover its purpose and mission. The freedom of religious creed and faith enabled religion classes to be taught even in public schools and

institutions providing Christian education could be established without previous restrictions. However, the circumstances for spreading the Gospel are still far from ideal. The church is struggling greatly from the lack of professional lay workers, who need to be educated and trained for efficient ministry. Christian schools are fighting the middle generation parents' distrust, dedicating much of their effort into convincing them that rooting Christian principles in their children's hearts is the most valuable asset for their future life.

Although the general public's mindset is still not welcoming, the time has never been more right and the need for change is urging. In 1998 this need resulted in the establishment of the Bible school in Martin, which educates and trains lay people in the area of teaching, social work, mission and youth ministries. Six years later, Lutheran elementary school welcomed its first students and in January 2012 Department of Religious studies within the University of Žilina was established. Since September 2012, the CCE has been blessed to be able to open the first year of Lutheran preschool, reaching our smallest ones. After almost 15 years of its existence, CCE now serves a total of 500 people on regular basis.

We are thankful to all of our partners helping us to use this historical opportunity for spreading the Gospel in the post-communist part of the World. Above all, we are grateful for God's continuous guidance and care, rejoicing over the place where the people of all ages can learn and experience the love of Christ!
