hospitality. Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another."

There is a lot to unpack from this small selection, but let's focus on one aspect with the opening words of verse 10, "Love one another with brotherly affection." One could argue this is Paul's thesis statement on how Christians should treat other Christians, especially the ones sitting in the pews next to them.

How do we "Love one another with brotherly affection?" Paul gives us a few ideas: "Contribute to the needs of the saints and seek to show hospitality... rejoice with those who rejoice and weep with those who weep." In other words, be there for each other, just as you would be there for your own brother or sister or father or mother.

What might this look like? It may be as simple as going out of your way (and your comfort zone) to greet newcomers in worship. It could be giving cards to those celebrating milestones or achievements. It certainly could be providing care, comfort, and/or food for those going through a tough time. It absolutely should be praying for those in need.

Our church does a lot of things well, but there is always room for improvement. Let's look to improve our "brotherly affection" for one another.

Pr. Barnhart's report: Youth Group on March 26th with about 17 kids. Held chapel at the Strasburg Care Center on March 27. Officiated a wedding on February 22nd. Will attend an LCMC leadership meeting July 9-11 with the LCMC Staff, Board of Trustees, Ministry Board, and District/Fellowship. First Communion Ed began March 12th.

Property Committee: New posts to mark parking lot entrances will be installed. Discussion on painting curbs for visibility. The bubbled spots on the basement floor have been located and marked with blue tape. Pres. Hendrickson will make contacts regarding the sheet metal on the first pillar out the south doors. The garbage disposal was replaced in the parsonage.

Stewardship Committee: Pr. Barnhart and Twila Van Boven are refining/evaluating giving envelopes. Pr. Barnhart is posting more about Online Giving in anticipation of summer. Motion approved for the disposal of financial records over seven years old.

Evangelism Committee has met and will meet again to discuss opportunities.

Old Business: Online banking has been established. An application was submitted to join the Linton Chamber of Commerce.

New Business: The council discussed the potential to expand the concrete in the parking lot and designate the area as handicap parking. Motion made to seek a bid for the concrete project. Spring clean-up is set for May 4^{th} after worship.



*With our secretary being out of the office due, a mission of the month giving report was unavailable at the time of printing. Rest assured, mission giving is being tracked and accounted for.




Vacation Bible School!

Country of the Month: Mexico



In Matthew 28:19, our Lord Jesus said, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations." Though it has become much more difficult and more expensive for churches to **go** to other nations, it is still our responsibility and good pleasure to **pray** for the nations around the world. After all, most nations around the world have people of faith living in them. Let us join together to pray for those around the world!

With this in mind, the Evangelism Committee would like to feature a new country each month for whom we can pray. Let's begin with our neighbor to the south: Mexico. The following prayer points come from operationworld.com, an organization that helps Christians to know how to pray for the nations.

Pray against the massive drug trade and gang violence in Mexico. Drug trafficking is big business in Mexico – thanks to both the USA's insatiable habit and Mexico's own growing troubles. This illicit trade fuels and enables other structures of sin – the cartels have expanded their activities to human trafficking, kidnapping, and extortion. Some specific prayer points:

- The 500,000-plus addicts. Mexico is poorly positioned to cope with the number of addicts in terms of prevention, treatment and ministry to those afflicted.
- The wealthy, powerful drug cartels. Most of their violence is directed toward each other, but police, armed forces, journalists and helpless citizens also die at their hands.
- The government and police face great difficulties in combating the drug problem. Informers, corruption, and fear undermine their effort. Pray for their courage, wisdom and integrity.
