Church Council Meeting Minutes Summary for Dec. 10th, 2025

Council members in attendance: Wayde Bauman, Mark Heidrich, Kevin Hendrickson, Erica Hoff-Wald, Edgar Ohlhauser, Jason Rossow, Shelly Serr, and Jennifer Vetter. Absent was Gunner Hanson

Pres. Hendrickson called for a review of the November 12, 2025, Regular Church Council Meeting Minutes. Edgar Ohlhauser made a motion to approve the minutes. Mark Heidrich seconded the motion. Motion unanimously carried.

Pres. Hendrickson called for the November Treasurer's Report. Wayde Bauman made a motion to approve the treasurer's report. Shelly Serr seconded the motion. Motion unanimously carried.

Pr. Barnhart's report. He provided the following items as his report: ECMA Ministerial Meeting, November 13, District Council Meeting, November 18, Youth Group, November 19, Strasburg Care Center Service, November 20, ECMA Thanksgiving Baskets, November 21, Preached at the ECMA Thanksgiving Service, November 23, Met with St. Luke's Council in Wishek to discuss LCMC, November 24, Started Bible Study in Lamentations and will do Galatians in the new year.

Property Committee report. The Property Committee noted handicap parking lines will need to be repainted in the spring.

Stewardship Committee report. The offering envelope list is cleaned up and envelopes will be ready for pick up. Pr. Barnhart in advertising Tithe.ly.


Worship Committee report. The Christmas Eve Candlelight Service is scheduled for 6:00pm and Christmas Day Worship for 10:00am with Holy Communion.

Education Committee report. The Sunday School Christmas Program is December 14, during the 10:45am service. Approximately \$435 dollars was spent updating costumes and purchasing props. The costs will be taken from the Sunday School Fund. Choir mics were purchased (approximately \$250) and will also be paid from the Sunday School Fund. A third step was built by Loren Hendrickson to accommodate space for the youngest children during the program.

Evangelism Committee report. The Evangelism and Stewardship Committees met and continued discussions and conversations related to the committee missions. A clothing drive for the Strasburg Care Center will be held in January. Mark Heidrich made a motion to form a formal partnership with Pr. Mawien Arik of South Sudan with a budget line item for financial support in the 2026 budget. Shelly Serr seconded the motion. Motion unanimously carried. Wayde Bauman made a motion to purchase a fuel gift card for a church member experiencing family illness involving significant travel. Edgar Ohlhauser seconded the motion. Motion unanimously carried.

New Business. Mark Heidrich made a motion to hire Jay Vetter for sidewalk snow removal. Edgar Ohlhauser seconded the motion. Motion carried with Jennifer Vetter abstaining from the vote. A snowblower will be purchased. Jay Vetter submitted a \$480 bill for snow removal. Mark Heidrich made a motion to pay the bill. Edgar Ohlhauser seconded the motion. Motion carried with Jennifer Vetter abstaining from the vote. The Annual Meeting is scheduled for January 25, 2026. Edgar Ohlhauser moved to hold the next Church Council meeting January 7, 2026 at 4:45pm. Reports from each committee are due January 9, 2026. The Annual Report will be assembled and available to the congregation by January 18, 2026. Edgar Ohlhauser made a motion to hire Jody Kelsch to complete an audit of the 2025 financials. Wayde Bauman seconded the motion. Motion unanimously carried. The Endowment Committee will have one vacancy. A replacement will be sought. The Church Council will have three vacancies. The Council is seeking three people to fill the vacancies.

The next meeting is Wednesday, January 7, 2026, at 4:45pm.




Mission of the Month



The **Salvation Army**, an international movement, is an evangelical part of the universal Christian Church. Its message is based on the Bible. Its ministry is motivated by the love of God. Its mission is to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ and to meet human needs in His name without discrimination.

Some of the needs met by the Salvation Army include helping disaster survivors, empowering youth, sharing God's love, overcoming poverty, combating addiction, curing hunger, and providing housing.

The **Salvation Army Northern Division** covers Minnesota and North Dakota and has a major donor to the Emmons County Ministerial Association's Thanksgiving Basket project each year.



Country of the Month: China

The survival and growth of the Church in China are awesome events in our generation! The atheist government strictly controls religious groups and banned all religious activity during the Cultural Revolution. Christians then started underground house-church networks designed to survive the persecution. Through radio ministries, Christian workers, and believers devoted to outreach, the Church did more than survive; it grew! The

government re-allowed registered churches in 1978 as a way to regain control over Christianity. But the unregistered churches just continued to grow. In fact, there is no growth story like it in all of church history. 2.7 million evangelicals in 1975 grew to over 75 million in just 35 years!

The traditional house-church networks formed the core of the Chinese Church for many decades. Preachers travelled far and wide across China. The intense persecution isolated them from the global Church and forced them to adopt indigenous ways. They focus strongly on prayer, revival, simple living, and on Christ! Most house-church Christians love their country, but their first loyalty is to God. They do not want to register with the government. Their illegal status leads to persecution. The mass migration to the cities will force these networks and churches to adapt. Some rural congregations get left without a leader, and some migrants struggle without a church group in the city. Pray that the strong commitment to God's Word, the power of the Holy Spirit, and the boldness to spread the gospel will all continue to shape this growing, changing movement.
